

The café has been going from strength to strength providing a range of valuable services and attracting people to our club that may not have been aware of its existence. We have now had several years of profitably opening the bar for members and guests Fridays and Sundays throughout most of the year and this consistency has paid dividends.

This awesome team has made my job so much easier, thanks to their dedication and willingness to roll up their sleeves and get involved whenever the Club needs a lifesaving presence.

It is a privilege to be surrounded by such giving and selfless individuals, a big thank you to all our patrolling members for all you do and the way you represent our club it is something to indeed be very proud of.

I hope to see all our patrolling members again next season with just as much enthusiasm and commitment to this great volunteering community.

BOAT CAPTAINS REPORT

I thank every member for their contribution to the Club, and for my opportunity to act as Boat captain for this season. It's an honour and a pleasure to breathe the same salty air as all you amazing people. This year I have witnessed exceptional people collaborating to achieve a goal. What unites them is an ongoing sense of purpose, tirelessly committed to keeping the boat sector of Darwin SLSC flourishing.

Equipment and maintenance wise there was not much to write home about, we patched up a couple of spots on the DKG boat, sent a couple of sets of oar handles down south to be refurbished and had the sliding seats for the marathon rowing events upgraded as we had a ladies team competing at the George Bass Marathon, more about that later in my report.

The Darwin Beach & Paddle Series has been a quite event again this season but I am happy to report that the GMB ladies of the "Darwin Boat People" crew were undefeated throughout the whole series!

During the season we saw the return of some friendly competition on the Friday night high tide. Most of the Darwin and even Mindil boaties enjoyed the races into the setting sun and the after-race critique on the club house deck.

Darwin SLSC boaties also managed to form an impromptu crew at the Northern Territory Titles in the Lifesaver Relay event. Congratulations to Greg (Hendy) Edwards, Steve (Krohnie) Krohn, Jade (Jaydee) Creek and Bob (Creeky) Creek swept by a member from the Broome Club to bring home the Gold Medal!

The biannual George Bass Marathon (GBM) is considered the toughest ocean-going race of its kind in the world, with competitors rowing 190km from Batemans Bay to Eden over seven gruelling legs, but just two days into the race fires forced the cancellation of the event as the race organisers took up roles as first responders in the unfolding emergency for thousands of people who took refuge at surf clubs throughout the South Coast region.

The "Darwin Boat People" with their support team in place were in a comfortable 4th place and just getting into the groove of racing once again but it was not to be as everything was abandoned and assistance given where it was needed most.

The team had made the decision to stay an extra night in Moruya before moving camp to head straight to Tathra instead of going to Bermagui which in the light of unfolding events was a good decision as 4000 people were stranded on beach and those Life Savers from the area and

rowers from the GBM were under the pump assisting where they could and were they were needed most from putting out spot fires on the roof of the club to keeping the evacuees calm and administering oxygen.

The Darwin team members at the Moruya camp contributed and did what they were able amongst the smoke and the heat as the town didn't have power and food supplies were almost non-existent. It was lucky our support boat for the race was full of fuel as this was syphoned out and used for the generators running the lights etc. for the camp. The team also cleaned up the camp site to make it safe and shared what food and hospitality they had to those that were evacuated from other areas in the path of the fire waiting it out until the roads re-opened.

After training for a little over 12 months up between 7-10 sessions per week it was a little disappointing but you can't stop nature!

Much of the sense of gratitude I have for the season that was, goes to the unsung heroes of the club who come back each year to do all those jobs that ensure the club and the boat sector run almost seamlessly, I want to give a special thank you to Marty (Koshy) Koch our previous boat captain who made the transition a breeze and my life very easy. In my first year as Boat captain I thank you all for this assistance and look forward to the 2020 season.

One such project is the observation deck and beach access ramp to the beach built and designed by Design Construct Ideas p/l. We were successful in receiving a grant in 2016 from NT Government Community Benefit Fund which allowed us to proceed with the construction and was completed earlier in the year It has proven beneficial to all user groups of our venue accessing the beach without having to negotiate the pedestrians utilising the café and a platform to watch the sunsets from is a great asset.

With enough funds left over from the grant after the initial construction the railing around the observation deck after several months required extra attention to ensure the safety of those utilising it along with materials to re-furbish with decking oil. Many thanks to all those members that assisted with this project

As part of the club's environment program the Wash down area was relocated closer to the dune to use the waste water to irrigate the grass instead of it dispersing underground. It is still a work in progress until we assess its viability and once all the associated aspects have been ironed out it will up-graded as permanent structure.

Another one of our larger projects that we were hoping to have been completed this season is the updating of the upstairs Bar area, it was not to be. Work is underway to reinforce the floor where the cool room sits to meet the upgraded engineering standards along with revising the architectural plans...... 

DARWIN FANNIE BAY SWIM CLASSIC

The Territory's own Open Water Darwin Fannie Bay Swim Classic is a one of kind event that is open to Surf Life Saving members and the public running for the past 15 years. With two distances to choose from it is a race that embodies the essence of fun and participation as well as more serious element for the more competitive at heart,

The 2019 swim had the largest field of entries in its 15year history and we had to cap the number of competitors due to the constraints on our water safety. The first swimmer across the line in the 1.2km Short course division was Hamish Bjornskov McDonald with a time of 23.56 minutes.

In the 2.1km Long course overall and the Male division winner was Giorgio Romano with a time of 29.59 minutes.

Megan Gallagher was first across the line in the Female division with a time 34.54minutes, brilliant swims by both competitors. Our eldest competitor in the 70+ years was Robert Patterson with an outstanding time of 47.06minutes

In our inaugural race back in 2005 with a time of 30.05minutes for the 2.1km Long course was Michael McEwan and the fastest swim time recorded by Giorgio Romano in 2017 was 27.54minutes.

The previous record for the course was set by one of our favourite DSLS club members, Rachael McLean in a time of 28.51minutes in 2009. A phenomenal swim that took 8 years to break.




DARWIN FANNIE BAY SWIM CLASSIC

On the polled results regarding the question of the likelihood of competing again 83% of swimmers said they would do it again and the overall rating the Fannie Bay Swim Classic came in at 75.86% with some comments in how to improve it which we are putting in place for the 2020 swim.

"I'l don't swim I live in pain soit helps me get moving." I absolutely love it." Hurst, who was competing in her second Fannie Bay. Classic after journeying to the Top End in 2012, said she had a brilliant time at the event.

"I wanted to come back up to Darwin because the people were so friendly and the support was fantastic," she said.
"It's great that they support disabled people.

"I hope to be back next year—hopefully the tides are coming in."



DIRECTOR OF FINANCE REPORT

On behalf of the Board of Directors for 2019, I present the Financial Statements of Darwin Surf Life Saving Club Inc, for the Members consideration and acceptance.

The 2018/2019 accounts have been audited by Susanne Lee and Associates. For details please refer to the Auditors Letter and Audited Financial Report at the rear of the Annual Report.

The financial Profit and Loss outcome for the year resulted in a deficit of \$48,636.87 primarily due to the club undertaking facilities improvement in 2019 and acquitting grant funding that was registered as income in 2016 and 2017; however, we continue to maintain a healthy balance sheet balance sheet of **\$428,155.58**.

The Club's cash position is relatively strong, as at 30th November 2019 our cash position is **\$230,917**

- General Account \$84,622.71
- Saving Account \$131,825.72
- Grants Account \$14,469.54

Overall the club is financially sound as reflected in the bank statements, however costs need to be constantly monitored in order to consolidate our position and capitalise on the grant expenditure and club improvements over the past few years. Utility expenses (power, water), increased clubhouse maintenance, insurances (member and building) and administrative costs continue to increase.

Planned expenditure an existing Grant for 2020 includes;

Gear Washdown area (\$6,000)

The club is also currently applying for several grants including a shade structure for the balcony, replacement IRB, defibrillator, iPads for Patrols, ice machine and further bar renovations. If successful, each of these items will make significant contributions to the Clubs operations and Life Saving capabilities.

Major purchases/expenditure for 2019 include:

\$ 65,127 Access ramp and Observation Deck

\$41,170 Utilities (Power, Water, Internet & Telephone)

\$ 22,546 Insurance (club house & members)

\$ 51,570 Salaries and wages

\$ 16,437 Fundraising & Fannie Bay Swim costs

\$ 19,380 Club house repairs, cleaning & maintenance

\$ 26,119 Return unspent grant funding (car park)

The club became GST registered from 1 October 2019 and as such all income prices have been reviewed and adjusted to include GST. Bar management has also been made more efficient in order to reduce overheads.

There is \$ 17,000 uniform and apparel in stock which needs to be sold to recover outstanding costs.

The committee agreed to write off \$28,534.73 of aged receivables. These outstanding payments have accrued since 2014. Many of these payments are bookkeeping records that were not adjusted within the financial year of the invoice and so carry over as aged receivables.

To summarise, our major areas of income for the club as indicated in the Profit and Loss report are:

- Bar income and Functions \$40,000 (approx)
- Membership fees \$14,000 (approx)

Sponsorships and the Darwin Fannie Bay Swim Classic \$20,000 (approx)

Fundraising (primarily Deckchair Cinema & Regurgitator-Concert) \$14,000 (approx)

SLS Foundation Distribution \$35,000 (approx.) Rental income & cost recovery (café electricity & water) \$20,000 (approx.)

Significant income was again received this year for the Darwin Fannie Bay Swim Classic (\$25.351.50).
